



The petition drive for a Fresh & Easy Neighborhood Market began in earnest on November 9 with a mass email announcement to the Serra Mesa Community Council's email list. This was followed by placement of large banners in key areas throughout Serra Mesa. The drive ended on December 1 with over 3,700 on-line and on-paper signatures being collected.

Thanks to everyone who responded. A special thank you goes to all of those dedicated volunteers who went door-to-door or who contacted their friends, neighbors, and/or customers collecting additional signatures! Additionally, we appreciate the letter of support for a market that was sent from County Supervisor Ron Roberts to the owner of the shopping center. In an email to SMCC Carleen Blandin stated, "The potential to have a Fresh and Easy grocery store in our neighborhood is an opportunity I personally don't want to pass up and I am very excited about this." Her statement represents the typical comment we heard or received. Additionally, Carleen summarized the value of a market:

Having a store of this type would enhance our community in so many ways:

- This store sells packaged small portions of foods so you can purchase just enough fish or meat for one meal and not have to freeze or waste excess
- Prices are excellent
- Fresh and Easy offers many preservative free items in their store
- Would make our community an even more attractive place to buy property and rent in
- Jobs for our community

The results of this petition drive have been shared with an owner of the Rancho Serra Mesa shopping center. The owner was very impressed by the outpouring of community support for obtaining a Fresh & Easy Neighborhood Market and will proceed with CVS negotiations. As soon as the outcome becomes available an email blast will be sent and the SMCC website updated.

Grocery Store History at Rancho Serra Mesa Shopping Center

Serra Mesa has been without a grocery store since the demise of Food Choice in 2007. In the March/April 2007 Observer edition Les Williamson, former Serra Mesa Community Council President, in reference to Food Choice stated "failing to do a proper market study factoring in their target audience, the shelves were stocked, to a significant extent, with unfamiliar products. This was pointed out to the owners and by me and others on numerous occasions, but no adjustments were made."

In July 2002 Henry's, which operated for many years at CVS's current site, closed their doors due to an inability to reach an agreement with their landlord.

This successful petition drive demonstrates that Serra Mesa is ready to embrace a grocery store that will meet the needs of the residents.



Trekking the neighborhood-A round of golf in the neighborhood!

I'm not even a golfer, but have several cronies who regularly hit the links. San Diego is blessed with a multitude of options for playing golf, including one right here in our community of Serra Mesa.

OK, I'll repeat that. You can play golf within a five minute drive, or ten-minute bike ride, from most sections of Serra Mesa. And where might that be, you ask? Well, try the course at Aero Drive and Kearny Villa Road (near 163), the one that is part of the Four Points Sheraton Hotel. A short walk behind the main lobby and refreshment area is this 9-hole Executive Golf Course. You probably won't be using your drivers, but your irons and putter will be put to good action. The course is a nice-looking area, with lots of trees and resembling a well-watered park.

OK, what's the catch? Probably a big chunk out of your wallet's sporting fees? If you can fork over \$12 that'll get you on that course, whether you're staying at the hotel or not. Bring your children and that will be another \$6. This is not an April Fool's joke either. And who knows, maybe if Tiger Woods hits town, he might decide the reasonable fees are better for his strained wallet.



First Sales at Civita Marks the Renaissance of a 75-Year-Old Sand and Gravel Operation in Mission Valley into a Walkable, Sustainable Village

SAN DIEGO -- With 500 homes and apartments currently under construction, Sudberry Properties' walkable and sustainable 230-acre village of Civita is easily the largest residential construction site in San Diego County. It's also among the most ambitious. After 10 years of planning, Sudberry Properties is transforming a 75-year-old sand and gravel quarry into a mixed-use oasis with 60 acres of parks, trails and public spaces, 4,780 residential homes and apartments in numerous configurations, and nearly a million square feet of retail shops, offices, and civic structures.

The 230-acre community, located north of Friars Road, between I-805 and Mission Center Road, expects buildout in 10 to 15 years at a cost of approximately \$2 billion. The first residents will be arriving soon. December marks the grand opening of Civita's first for-sale attached neighborhood -- Origen by guest builder Shea Homes. In January, leasing will commence

at the first apartment community, Circa 37, whose name recalls the year that mining started on the site. Residents are expected to move into both neighborhoods next spring.

"Origen is a fine example of Civita's commitment to sustainable design, architectural character, smart growth principles, community spirit, and uncompromising quality," said Marco Sessa, senior vice president of Sudberry Properties.

Origen features three- and four-story attached homes with urban-style architecture, dramatic vertical lines, and generous volume spaces. Prices at Origen start in the low \$400,000s.

Sudberry Properties' Circa 37, a multi-family apartment neighborhood located in the southwest corner of Civita, will feature classic architecture with an urban vibe, and a luxuriously equipped, resort-like recreation center with a saltwater pool and extensive amenities. Lease rates are expected to range from approximately \$1,500 to \$3,000 per month.

The heart of Civita, which sets the tone for the entire community, is an amenity-rich community park with two miles of trails that radiate into each neighborhood and encourage walking and neighborly interactions.

"Inspired by San Diego's natural network of canyons, the Park District will create a highly visible greenbelt spine that visually connects Serra Mesa to the San Diego River Valley," said Sessa.

The enhanced city park will have intimate areas for reflection and relaxation, as well as large open lawn areas. Specific details for the park will evolve out of a series of community planning sessions set for next year.

The Park District will be adjacent to the community's Civic Center that will further celebrate Mission Valley's connection to the San Diego River with a museum operated by the San Diego River Park Foundation.

"Civita's location in the heart of San Diego was the muse for every aspect of the community," said Sessa. "Civita is taking advantage of its proximity to the San Diego Trolley by building a pedestrian bridge over Friars Road. As a result, most Civita residents will have an easy 10- to 15-minute stroll to the trolley. Civita is also planning to offer residents a shuttle system and a hybrid-car sharing program to provide easy access to all Mission Valley has to offer.

To create the community's unique landscape character, Sudberry Properties sought out esteemed landscape architecture firms with decidedly different points of view and asked them to create a landscape tapestry that was lush, colorful and water-wise. Lifescapes International, Inc., which has designed 15 luxuriant casinos on the Las Vegas Strip and high-end resorts around the world, and San Diego's Schmidt Design Group, known for its artistic artistry and environmental sensitivity, came together to create a botanical wonderland that takes advantage of Civita's unique location and climate.

"We're set designers - sets you can actually live in," said Don Brinkerhoff, chairman of Lifescapes International, whose philosophy was reinforced by a professor from Madrid, who counseled, "'If you want to be happy for an hour, go to dinner; if you want to be happy for a lifetime, plant a garden."

As a result, Civita will be replete with formal gardens and massed plantings that emphasize color, texture and form. Medians don't present a single row of trees marching down the street; rather, they combine flowering trees, shrubs, and flowers to create a lush garden ambiance that will define Civita.

The landscape team's initial design is now visible along the new Civita Boulevard that traverses the community west to east, starting at Mission Center Road.

Brinkerhoff says he has an easy-to-follow rule for creating spectacular landscapes: "Buy big trees." Trees take a long time to grow, he said, "So if you buy big trees, you're buying ten to 15 years of life."

The developer of Civita took that recommendation to heart. Many of the trees are three times larger than typical landscape specimens. And, for Arbor Day last year, Sudberry Properties planted a Moreton Bay Fig (Ficus Macrophylla) that was 30 feet tall and 30 feet wide with eight trunks - similar in size and impact to one of Balboa Park's landmark specimens.

Sudberry Properties' attention to detail is already paying off. It has amassed numerous prestigious awards for its earth-friendly and sustainable design, including the Governor's Environmental and Economic Leadership Award (GEELA), California's highest environmental honor. Last year, Civita was identified as a 'Catalyst Project" for the California Sustainable Strategies Pilot Program by the state's Department of Housing and Community Development. The Civita plan achieved a "Gold" certification from the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED-ND pilot program for its numerous sustainable features.

New Year, Fresh Start

Happy New Year! As everyone begins their New Year's resolutions, I wanted to share some of our 2012 resolutions down at City Hall. This year, the City Council has pledged to make San Diego an easier place to do business.

For most of 2011, I worked with my colleagues to develop and implement my Small Business Policy Package. Many of my suggested reforms have been accomplished, like the hiring of a Small Business Liaison, and the reinstatement of Regulatory Relief Day. In 2012, we will see the rest of those reforms come to fruition.

January 2012 will be the first ever meeting of a new City Council committee dedicated entirely to Economic Development and Strategies. Prior to the formation of this committee, there was no clear place for business related issues to be addressed by the City Council. Some issues would go before the Land Use & Housing committee, while others would be sent to Natural Resources & Culture. I am proud to serve as Vice Chair of this new committee dedicated to improving San Diego's economy.

In addition, February 2012 will be the first ever Code Compliance Amnesty month for businesses in the City of San Diego. Many business owners have let me know that they would like to expand or improve their facilities, but are hesitant to begin the projects. They've told me stories about how budgeted projects sometimes double or triple in costs because of unknown code violations that become uncovered.

So this February, business owners do not have to worry about being penalized by code violations provided they come forward, apply for permits, and bring the violations up to code in a specific amount of time. This change will save businesses money on projects and incentivize the correction of out of code improvements and business expansion.
