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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I had the opportunity to be in attendance to hear Paul Greenwood speak about Elder Abuse. Paul is a Deputy District Attorney, Head of Elder Abuse Unit Family Protection Division for the City of San Diego. He is active and especially passionate about offenders who intentionally harm the elderly by taking advantage of their culpability. As most abusive activities start in the family, it is important that those who are either incapable or unable to direct their financial directives have a recourse to deal with their insufficiencies. Paul also discusses those issues to watch for by persons specifically intending to take advantage of those unable to recognize harmful activities. Paul gives us some insight with his "Ten Tips" based on those things that he has seen when defending those who have been the subject of abuse.

Ten Tips To Help You Reduce The Risk Of Becoming The Next Victim Of Financial Elder Abuse

1) Choose a caregiver with caution

Do not assume that by hiring a caregiver through a bonded agency you are guaranteed to get someone who has been checked. There is no current law requiring mandatory background checks for in-home caregivers in California.

2) Keep an inventory of all jewelry

Jewelry is the number one item that is stolen from homes occupied by elders. Not only should your jewelry be kept in a locked drawer, you should have photographs of rare, valuable or sentimental items in a separate location. In the event of theft, such photographic evidence will be useful in tracking down the missing jewelry at a pawn shop.

3) Every home should have a shredder

Every piece of mail containing your name, address, and any other identifying information should be shredded before being discarded. The most effective type of shredder is the criss-cross cut shredder. Even envelopes with your name and address should be shredded. Never throw away old checkbooks from closed accounts or bank credit card application forms. There is no danger in over shredding!

4) Protect your incoming and outgoing mail

Never allow incoming mail to sit in an unsecured mailbox. Mailbox theft is rampant. Similarly, never leave outgoing mail in an unsecured mailbox with the red flag raised, as this simply provides an easy alert to the thief who is cruising the streets. Consider either purchasing a locked mailbox or renting a post office from your local post office.

5) Obtain a credit search on yourself at least two or three times a year

Identity theft is rampant. The only way to have peace of mind is to obtain a credit search on yourself periodically from one of the three major credit bureaus – Experian, Equifax and Trans Union. This will enable you to discover whether someone has applied for or obtained a credit card in your name.

6) Every telephone should have caller i.d. fitted

All modern telephones are equipped with Caller I.D. capability and the minimal cost of this extra service is well worth it. By seeing if the incoming call is classified as "private" or "unknown" this will allow you to be immediately on your guard. Crooks love the telephone. It is now their weapon of choice.

7) You will never win the Canadian lottery

If a smooth talking 25 year old male tells you on the telephone that you are the proud winner of the Canadian lottery, he is a liar. Similarly, emails from Nigeria and letters from Madrid, indicating that you could receive a substantial amount of money, are always fraudulent.

8) Consider allowing your bank to send a duplicate copy of your monthly statement to a trusted family member or professional advisor

Sadly, most financial elder abuse cases are only reported or discovered six to nine months after the initial losses have occurred. Elders whose sight is failing are at greater risk because they may rely upon the very person who is stealing from them to insure that the financial transactions are in order. An independent pair of

Serra Mesa Enhancement Committee

Role: Information, Education, Cooperation, & Assistance in the area of Code Compliance. The intent of the committee is to inform residents of some typical neighborhood codes. Many people are simply not aware of the codes, whose main purpose is to help keep the community looking nice, keep peace among its neighbors, and prevent nuisances in the neighborhood.

Procedures:

- A citizen can fill out a Request for Investigation form anonymously if desired or send a note with a description of the violation and the address to SMEC, P.O. Box 23315, San Diego, CA 92193 or send an email to serramesaenhancementcommittee@hotmail.com. If a code violation is confirmed, a letter is sent to the resident.
- If SMEC doesn't hear from the resident and the violation still exists, another letter is sent indicating a deadline.
- After the deadline if the violation hasn't been corrected, the case is referred to the appropriate government department.
- If there are extenuating circumstances, residents are encouraged to write to SMEC so that the situation can be considered before proceeding to the next step.

Code Violations Referral: SMEC makes referrals only as a last resort. If a resident receives a letter from the City Zoning Investigations Department, but did not receive any letters from SMEC, then it was not SMEC who made a referral to the City. Any citizen may make referrals directly to the City.

Accomplishments: SMEC provides information through regular *Observer* columns and an information sheet on code compliance topics for new homeowners. The efforts of SMEC have resulted in improvements in many residences in Serra Mesa and the resolution of community issues. The identity of SMEC cases is kept confidential

Violations: Since SMEC's inception in 1996 over 1,850 violations have been processed. The violations include barking dogs, excessive noise, fences in disrepair, graffiti, general improvement, illegal home businesses, inoperable vehicles, lawn parking, excessive litter, plants on sidewalk, rodent infestation, sidewalk parking, illegal signs, illegal street parking, storage of wood, temporary structures, trash cans, and excessive weeds.

Illegally parked vehicles on the street and inoperable vehicles are usually turned over directly to Vehicle Abatement. For barking dogs and excessive noise violations we send informational letters to residents asking for compliance and provide the complainants with information needed to pursue the issue.

Trash and Recycle Containers. This information is in response to a couple of complaints SMEC has received. Trash and recycling containers may be placed at the curb only after 6:00 p.m. the night before pickup and must be returned to the proper storage by 6:00 p.m. on pickup day. Storage of the containers in a non-visible site (side or back yard) improves the appearance of the neighborhood.



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County Reports Four Bats Tested Positive For Rabies

Public Should Not Handle Bats, Skunks, Raccoons and Other Wild Animals

While bats, skunks, raccoons and other wild animals might be interesting to look at. Touching them—even when they're dead—could expose you to rabies.

The County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) reports that four of 20 bats submitted for rabies testing to HHSA's Public Health Laboratory since January 1, 2010 have tested positive for rabies. All four bats tested positive for rabies during the month of June.

HHSA is reminding the public to stay away from bats and other wild animals to prevent possible exposure to rabies.

"Bat contact and sightings often occur this time of year. However, bats may be carriers of rabies, a disease that can be deadly," said Wilma Wooten, M.D., M.P.H., County Public Health Officer. "If you see a bat, dead or alive, don't touch it."

The small teeth of a bat can make a bite difficult to find. Rabies transmission may also occur if a bat's saliva comes in contact with a person's open wounds or mucous membranes such as your eyes, nose or mouth. The local medical community has also been alerted.


Bats are most often observed by people during the summer months when young bats leave the roost, insects are abundant, and people leave windows open at night to counter the heat. If a bat is found in your home or on your property, do not touch it. Contact a local animal control agency to pick it up.

If direct contact with a bat does occur, wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water and get medical advice immediately. The bat should be safely captured and picked up by a local animal control agency to submit for rabies testing. For service in the City of San Diego and the unincorporated areas of the county, call (619) 236-4250.

Rabies in humans can be prevented by avoiding contact with wild, stray, and unknown domestic animals; ensuring pets are up-to-date on rabies vaccinations; and receiving prompt medical advice following animal bites and other significant exposures to potentially rabid animals.

About Montgomery Field

This is the time of year when people leave their windows open and noise from Montgomery Field is more apparent. The following information has been copied from the City of San Diego's web site, http://www.sandiego.gov/airports/montgomery/montfaq.shtml#airport.

Flight Procedures

What are the hours of operation for the Air Traffic Control Tower?

The normal hours of operation are 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. (PST) daily.

Do I need a Class B clearance to depart Montgomery Field?

No, you can call Ground Control on 118.225 MHZ or Clearance Delivery on 127.45 to receive clearance through Class B Airspace.

Where is the compass rose located?

The southwest end of taxiway G.

What is the largest aircraft that can use Montgomery Field?

Montgomery Field is restricted to aircraft having a maximum certified take off gross weight of 20,000 pounds or less.

Services and Facilities

What services and facilities are available?

There are flight schools, repair and maintenance shops, aircraft rental, sales, and storage, fuel, rental cars, and a restaurant located at Montgomery Field. The surrounding area offers hotels, restaurants, and a wide range of commercial and visitor services.

As a certified flight instructor, can I use Montgomery Field to provide flight training to individuals?

Yes, if you have a Commercial Operators Permit available from the Airport Operations Center to conduct business at the airport.

eyes that is able to look over bank statements every 30 days will be able to catch suspicious activities in the early stages.

9) Don't assume that the friendly handyman is, in fact, licensed

Before committing to any work on your home, always obtain at least three estimates in writing and check on the name of the contractor with both the Better Business Bureau and with the State License Contractor's Board. Just because someone gives you an impressive business card with a contractor's license number on it, this does not mean that the person is qualified. The license number may have, in fact, been stolen. Additionally, never pay more than 10% of the contract price up front.

10) Always have a second line of defense at your front door

You should either have a locked screen door or a security chain guard at your front door. Crooks will attempt to gain entry to your home by using excuses such as a fake emergency, or false uniforms and badges. By having a second line of defense, you will be able to communicate with the stranger on the doorstep without exposing yourself to the possibility of a forced entry. Never allow any stranger into your home, even if the emergency seems real. Instead, tell the stranger that you will call 911.

23 April 2008—Remember when you were a kid and your parents made a big fuss about turning off the light when you left a room? Who knew that, besides adding to the monthly electric bill, keeping a single 60-watt lightbulb lit for 12 hours uses as much as 60 liters of water? According to researchers at the Virginia Water Resources Research Center, in Blacksburg, Va., fossil-fuel-fired thermoelectric power plants consume more than 500 billion L of fresh water per day in the United States alone. "That translates to an average of 95 L of water to produce 1 kilowatt-hour of electricity," says Tamim Younos, associate director of the center and a professor of water resources at Virginia Tech, where the center is housed.

Why so much? Water plays a number of roles in energy production, including pumping crude oil out of the ground, helping to remove pollutants from power plant exhaust, generating steam that turns turbines, flushing away residue after fossil fuels are burned, and keeping power plants cool.

The electric power produced for our residences come from power plants through a power distribution grid. The electric power derives from a power site within the power plant. The power site of a power system consists of a central mover like a turbine that is then pushed by water or steam to run a system of generators.

Total Electricity usage (all applications) per year for comparison:

USA 12,000 kWh per capita California 8,000 kWh per capita

California's 8,000 kWh per capita equates to 181,000 gallons of water per year to create that energy. By planting shade trees strategically around your property you can reduce energy consumption by as much as 12%.

If you plant a tree today on the west side of your home, in five years your energy use should be 3% less (5,430 gallons saved). In 15 years the savings will be nearly 12% (21,720 gallons of water saved). - Dr. E. Greg McPherson, Center for Urban Forest Research.

This is more than enough to justify watering that little sapling for a few years until it starts paying off BIG TIME!.

Airport Noise Restrictions

Who do I contact to complain about airplane noise at Montgomery Field?

Call the Montgomery Field Airport Noise Abatement Officer at (858) 573-1436 or email at wreiter@sandiego.gov.

What happens when a complaint is made regarding airport noise at Montgomery Field?

The complaint is investigated to determine if a violation of airport noise regulations occurred. If there was a violation, a citation will be issued to the aircraft operator. If there was not a violation but the complaint resulted from a poor or nonstandard aircraft operating technique, the aircraft operator will be contacted and asked to change his operating procedures to prevent a recurrence. Complaints are kept on file and their locations plotted for trend analysis purposes.

What noise abatement restrictions are in effect?

The daytime noise limit of 88 decibels is in effect from 6:30 a.m. - 11:30 p.m. The night time noise limit of 70 decibels is in effect from 11:30 p.m. to 6:30 a.m. These limits apply in residential areas near the airport.

Is there a curfew at Montgomery Field?

No. The airport is open for public use at all times. There are very restrictive night time noise limits between 11:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m.

How are noise regulations enforced?

A very extensive noise monitoring system which includes eleven devices to record noise levels in communities surrounding the airport. When a violation is detected a citation is issued to the aircraft owner. The fines can range up to \$250 dollars. Aircraft operators are informed that noise restrictions are strictly enforced, monitored, and of the potential fine amounts.

Why is there airplane traffic during the middle of the night... aren't they in violation?

Occasional violations do occur, and there are also aircraft which are exempt from the noise limits such as emergency medical flights, and government - local, State, Federal and law enforcement aircraft.

Is there a minimum legal altitude planes can fly over residential areas?

Federal Air Regulations specify a minimum altitude of 1,000 feet over congested areas except when in the Airport Traffic Area for take off and landing.

Are helicopters subject to the same regulations?

Federal Air Regulations do not specify a minimum altitude for helicopters. They normally operate no less than 500 feet above the ground.

Can the City require helicopters to fly at higher altitudes?

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has the sole authority to control air traffic. Neither the City of San Diego nor the State of California can regulate the altitude, speed, direction, or location of aircraft in flight.



This free subscription service acts as a "cyber" neighborhood watch, providing citizens with information to help reduce crime in their neighborhoods and to increase interaction between neighbors and SDPD.

To subscribe, go to this link: http://apps.sandiego.gov/ewatch. When you subscribe you enter your address and email address. You select the radius of miles (up to one e mile) and types of crimes. Usually the day after the cime incident you receive an email with the incident type, date, time, and location (by hundred block).
