

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



One of the wonderful things that I have found in the leadership of this community is the coming together to consensus of different backgrounds and opinions for the common good. Our SMCC board is made up of wonderful community people with different political and economic backgrounds, yet we can reason together and find a solution to just about any situation. Why can't it be that way with our local and national leadership. We are certainly not smarter than they are, but why not come together and discuss differences and solutions with out walking away in disgust. That seems to be the way in Washington, Sacramento, and San Diego. For instance, Toni Adkins recently wrote in an article for the Mission Times Courier (May 19th) that California should adopt single-payer health care. It involves the ACA (Affordable Care Act) which has recently been repealed by the US House of Representatives. What Senator Adkins is proposing is a single-payer universal health care system which would make the state everyone's insurer. "In addition to providing universal health care, the goal is to reduce overall health care costs as we streamline the system." Senator Adkins adds that she believes that health care is a right just like education and safety protection."

On the same page of the same Guest Editorial Section, Representative Darrell Issa states that this year California monthly health insurance premiums will increase by an average of 13% and that premiums have risen an average of \$5,000 a year. Representative Issa uses the example of the State of Maine where they created an "invisible high-risk pool" to provide support for individuals with pre-existing conditions. By doing this, everyone could participate in the state system at the same rates with the result of premiums being reduced as much as \$7,000 per year.

My point is that both Senator Adkins and Representative Issa are stating that a Washington top-down health care solution has failed. There are solutions but our lawmaker's self-interests supersede the common good and we pay to suffer. If this whole issue were brought to the Serra Mesa Community Council for resolution, I believe we could come to consensus and solve the problem. Maybe like the insurance company advertisement asserts, we have chosen the wrong candidates. Why don't our elected officials adopt the same health care for themselves as they want us to have and lead the right way, from the front?

Franklin Ridge Road Connection Update

The Serra Mesa Planning Group (SMPG) unanimously approved the letter developed by the Franklin Ridge Road Subcommittee in response to the recirculated draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the Serra Mesa Community Plan Amendment Roadway Project. The Recirculated DEIR is at https://www.sandiego.gov/planning/programs/ceqa. The roadway project refers to the Franklin Ridge Road connection between Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa and Civita in Mission Valley.

Additionally, SMPG voted unanimously to approve a position statement regarding the community plan amendment. The position statement is included in this Observer. SMPG has received confirmation that the position statement will be included in the staff report.

Meeting with City Councilmember Scott Sherman - Representatives of SMPG attended a June 15th meeting with Councilmember Sherman and his staff explaining SMPG's position and providing justification for withdrawal of the amendment. Councilmember Sherman and his staff listened attentively, indicated he's also meeting with other groups, and would check with staff in regards to answers to our questions.

Next Steps in the Process –Staff is required to write a response to all comments. 114 letters were received. In the past staff has indicated that responses wouldn't be available until two weeks prior to the Planning Commission hearing. After this hearing the item is forwarded to the City Council's Smart Growth & Land Use Committee and then onto the City Council, the final decision maker. All of these hearings are open to the public.

Tentative Schedule for Hearings - When a definite date is confirmed for a hearing an email notice to the SMCC's email list will be sent with information about participating in the process.





Landmark tribute for notable Serra Mesa nature preserver





Serra Mesa is blessed with many natural canyons, providing opportunities for residents to take a stroll or serious hike into the canyons, thus enjoying nature while adding to personal fitness. Our major canyon has a familiar name as it's at the end of Ruffin Road and located next to Taft Middle School. Serra Mesa environmental activists, working with the Sierra Club and Council member Donna Frye, saw success in January 2003 when the City Council voted to set aside this area as dedicated open space.

A key player in making that happen and continuing on for a dozen more years as leader of the Friends of Ruffin Canyon was Serra Mesa resident Bonnie Hough. The Friends, working with SD City Park & Rec, took on the major role of managing and upgrading this specific canyon and other natural areas in our community. Bonnie and the Friends partnered with Taft Middle School, wrote grants, and in 2005 formed the Taft Service Club that created and enhanced the native plant garden right beside Taft. For many years the Friends have organized frequent work parties at this garden to remove invasive weeds, plant native plants, and water as needed.

Bonnie passed away two years ago and, with the efforts of the Friends and San Diego City Park & Rec., on May 25 a plaque honoring her was placed in this Bonnie Hough Native

Habitat Garden. You can see the plaque and the kiosk describing the person the Garden is named for and stroll around to enjoy the many plants in bloom right now. Looking at Taft from the main road, Gramercy, the marked entry is to the left. The best way is to walk or bike from your neighborhood, or alternately there is parking in the Ruffin Road cul-de-sac, adjacent streets, and on weekends or after work you can park in the Taft School lot.

The Friends invite all to come join their frequent work parties, held right here at Ruffin, at Shawn Canyon off Mission Village Drive, and the yet-to-be-named trail from the SM Park and Rec Center over to the SM/KM Library. They mostly meet on the first Saturday of each month, from 9 a.m. - noon at the specific canyon entrance (the July 1 location will be at Taft/Ruffin). Volunteers experience rewards by seeing how their efforts have significantly enhanced the access, native foliage, scenery and enjoyment of our canyons. For information check the SM web site.

In accordance with our mandate under Article II, Section 1 of Council Policy 600-24 to make recommendations to the City Council, Planning Commission, and City staff concerning the preparation of, adoption of, implementation of or amendment to a land use plan, the Serra Mesa Planning Group hereby presents the following comments for inclusion in the staff report to the Planning Commission and City Council on the Proposed Serra Mesa Community Plan Amendment Roadway Connection Project, Project No. 265605 SCH No. 2012011048.

SERRA MESA PLANNING GROUP'S SUMMARY/POSITION STATEMENT

- 1. SMPG recommends <u>AGAINST</u> amending the Serra Mesa Community Plan to include the roadway connection for the following reasons:
 - The emergency connection is redundant and is neither required nor necessary.
 - The connection will not improve overall traffic flow in the study area and, in fact, will degrade it.
 - The proposed Amendment has been rejected numerous times by Planning Commission (2004 and 2008) and City Council (2005).
 - The connection is strongly opposed by the affected Community.
- SMPG recommends <u>NOT</u> to amend the Serra Mesa Community Plan to include a roadway connection on the basis
 that the Recirculated DEIR does not meet project objectives and shows a significant negative environmental impact
 on traffic. The Recirculated DEIR inadequately studied noise and pollution impacts (e.g., sensitive receptors not
 considered).

The Recirculated DEIR is NOT complete and NOT in compliance with CEQA. Information is fundamentally inadequate and conclusory.

- Two communities are connected with the existing emergency, pedestrian and bicyclist access between Kaplan Drive in Serra Mesa and Aperture Circle in Mission Valley. Also, at least one trail for pedestrians and bicyclists from Civita to Phyllis Place Park is mandated with or without the roadway connection.
- Mission Center Road and Mission Village Drive provide interconnectivity between the two communities.
- 3. SMPG recommends that the proposed Community Plan Amendment be <u>DENIED</u>. The CPA does not meet proposed goals and does not benefit the residents of either community.
- 4. SMPG recommends that the Mission Valley Community Plan be <u>REVISED</u> to exclude the Franklin Ridge Road Connection as it is not mitigable below a significant level and negatively impacts transportation/circulation in both communities.

EMERGENCY ROAD CONNECTION ANALYSIS FLAW

When the City Council requested the initiation of this CPA in 2008, their discussion was heavily focused on public safety, emergency evacuation, and fire department access. Unfortunately, no one who was so authorized informed the Council during this discussion that there is already an emergency-only connection at Kaplan Drive from Civita to Serra Mesa designed into the project and currently in use.

ROADWAY CONNECTION IMPACTS

- Required 1.33 acre linear park along Phyllis Place divided in two by connection safety issues
- Required to relocate high-pressure gas line
- Impacts environment, constructed through sensitive habitat, particularly coastal sage scrub
- Impacts 56 multifamily retirement/Senior units located across from roadway connection
- Creates "Potential to result in safety hazard for vehicles entering or exiting the City View Church" (5.2.6.1); church is located across from roadway intersection; church driveway and roadway intersection won't align
- Steep grade (developer indicates steepest just under 10%) not considered in noise and air quality studies
- Mitigation requires removal of bicycle lanes on both sides of Murray Ridge to Sandrock Road; "City's ability to implement...may be limited" so "impact would remain significant and unavoidable" (DEIR, p. 5.2-39)
- Implementation of 6 of the 19 mitigations violates City's land use and mobility policies; 8 of the 19 mitigations assumes mitigation will not occur; 10 of the 19 mitigations would remain Significant and Unavoidable
- Huge traffic increase into a residential community brings with it by definition additional safety and quality of life issues (noise, accidents, parking, and pollution for example)

TRAFFIC IMPACTS

Roadway connection "generally relieve congestion on neighborhood streets" (DEIR, p. 5-1-15). This isn't proven by the traffic studies long term analysis. See attachment for charts.


MISSION VALLEY COMMUNITY PLAN INCONSISTENCY

The Sand and Gravel Re-use Development section of the Mission Valley Community Plan (p. 56) states "Streets serving new development should be connected to the road network and not to major streets serving residential areas in the mesas." This statement is consistent with the Serra Mesa Community Plan.


SERRA MESA COMMUNITY OPPOSITION

The surveys conducted in the community over the years indicate overwhelming opposition to the street connection. The Serra Mesa Planning Group and members of the community have repeatedly expressed strong opposition to the street connection in writing and in person at all stages of the development process for Quarry Falls/Civita, and continue to express their opposition to the proposed Community Plan Amendment.


Analysis of the LOS Level Long-Term Baseline vs Long-Term Cumulative with Project*



In both Serra Mesa and Mission Valley the greatest percentage of the roadway segments will receive the same LOS level. Also, in Serra Mesa $^{1}/_{3}$ of the segments will worsen and none will improve.



The LOS No Change is almost 100% percentage for Mission Valley while in Serra Mesa both No Change and Worsen receive the same percentage.



In Mission Valley 70% of the intersections won't change LOS level while in Serra Mesa more than half of the intersections will worsen.

Conclusion: The road connection won't help most of the roadway segments and intersections in Mission Valley and will worsen ones in Serra Mesa.

On-Ramps for Long-Term Without the Roadway Connection in Comparison to With (refer to Table 5.2.18)

- Murray Ridge I-805 NB on-ramp AM delay increases 9 min; queueing from 0 to 3,886 ft (.74 mi).
- Murray Ridge I-805 SB on-ramp PM delay increases 31 min; queueing from 2,407 to 10,368 ft (1.96 mi), beyond Sandrock.
