



AN APP THAT MAKES YOU A LIFE SAVER

New PulsePoint rollout can help deliver CPR before first responders arrive

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is a leading cause of preventable death in San Diego County. It can strike anywhere at any time. Now, a new smartphone app can help swiftly deliver CPR to victims in the critical minutes before first responders can arrive.

The free app is called PulsePoint. It works by alerting CPR-trained civilians to a cardiac emergency within a quarter mile radius, with the alert going out nearly simultaneously to a 9-1-1 operator dispatching paramedics.

After working more than six months to get our regions dispatch centers and fire departments trained and on board, we launched the app in late July. My hope is that everyone downloads the app, even those who have yet to learn CPR.

Once PulsePoint is downloaded, those with CPR training are asked to "check" a box confirming they are available to respond. Everyone else still has access to an array of features, including a scrolling list of local traffic, fire and medical emergency alerts and Live Dispatch Radio. My hope is these users will later be inspired to seek out the widely available CPR training provided by the American Red Cross, American Heart Association, San Diego Project Heartbeat and others so they too can check the box.

Using mapping technology, the PulsePoint app directs nearby responders directly to a stricken individual's location and alerts them to the availability of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), a simple to use automated device that can shock a heart back into its correct rhythm.

Today, we know that every minute a victim of sudden cardiac arrest waits for CPR their survival chances drop by up to 10 percent, and after four to six minutes, brain damage begins.


PulsePoint's success here will depend on the involvement of trained San Diegans in essentially crowd sourcing early CPR aid. Please visit sdcounty.ca.gov/appcenter to learn how you can help save a life.



MORE POTHOLE REPAIRS IN SERRA MESA

Thanks to increased street funding in Mayor Faulconer's FY 2015 budget and reorganizations to pothole repair crews, more pothole repairs are happening in the Serra Mesa community.

In the recently approved budget, 16 additional full-time city workers have been hired to focus solely on pothole repairs. These new workers are expected to double the amount of asphalt repairs annually in the City.

In the past, road-crews responded to pothole complaints as they came in. This means that a repair crew could fix a pothole in Serra Mesa and drive across town to fix another pothole even if the next street over in needed repairs.

As a result of an Audit Committee recommendation, the old way has been changed to a more effective and efficient way of fixing potholes. Pothole repair crews now stay in one district the whole day fixing reported pothole problems in the district.

For this new measure to work effectively, it is important for Serra Mesa residents to report potholes right away. To report potholes online, please visit the website here: http://apps.sandiego.gov/streetdiv/. Residents can also call and report a pothole at (619) 527-7500. For a calendar of when repair crews will be in the district, please visit the link here: http://www.sandiego.gov/street-div/pdf/potholeschedule.pdf.

SERRA MESA VILLAGE DEVELOPING

Serra Mesa may not have a building for a Senior Center nor a social service agency focused on seniors; but what it does have is a dynamite Steering Committee, supported by the Serra Mesa Community Council, working to bring the "Village" concept here. "Villages" have been developing around the US with the first one in Boston's Beacon Hill in 2002 (check it out at www.beaconhillvillage.org). "Villages" are networks of seniors (and people who care about them) for seniors to embrace life and make each day the best possible. Most "Villages" include social activities, classes, community service, and support systems for those with chronic conditions or increasing frailty. One of the hallmarks of a "Village" is to know the resources available to seniors in the city and county. "Villages" are membership organizations, locally developed and run. The Serra Mesa Village Steering Committee anticipates having membership applications available by October or November with its first general membership meeting in January 2015.

The Steering Committee is open to additional members who want to see this concept come to Serra Mesa. You need to commit to attend the weekly meetings where plans/decisions are made and to take on at least one task to work on between meetings. Steering Committee meetings are held at Gethsemane, 2696 Melbourne Drive (across from Juarez Elementary School), on Mondays from 1:30-3:00 p.m. There is an Interest Survey in this issue of the Observer to find out what Serra Mesa residents want/need. The Steering Committee has set a "Meet and Greet" for Sunday, November 2, from 2-4 p.m. in the Community Room at the Serra Mesa Library on Aero Drive. SERRA MESA PLANNING GROUP NEWS

The Serra Mesa Planning Group (SMPG) is officially recognized by the City and makes recommendations on land use issues to the City. SMPG meets the third Thursday of the month, 7 pm, at the Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa Library, 9505 Aero Drive. The August meeting wasn't held since there weren't any agenda items. The next meetings are September 18 and October 16. To contact us, email smpg@serramesa.org.

Summary of July 15 Meeting

Prioritization of Serra Mesa Projects for using Broadstone Ad Hoc Fees (\$3,504,000) – New information on the cost of the joint use projects meant that SMPG's previous prioritization list (Taft Joint Use, Cabrillo Hts Western Field Lighting, Ruffin Canyon Trail, Juarez Joint Use ADA) needed reviewing. SMPG met jointly with the Serra Mesa Parks & Recreation Council and City staff. Both groups agreed to recommend Taft Middle School Joint Use Project (4.75 acres for \$3,270,271) as their number one priority.

City Councilmember Scott Sherman's office makes the final decision and will follow up with the City's budgeting process. In the future the Serra Mesa Parks & Recreation Council will conduct community meetings to determine the amenities for the joint use project.

Update - AeaLAS Charter School withdrew their application for a conditional use permit at 9160 Gramercy Road (former Guild Mortgage building). The time limit on their escrow for the building wasn't extended.

September 18 Agenda Item

Cardinal Slope Easement Vacation, Cameron Brothers Company. Description: Application request to vacate a 0.277 acre slope easement located at 2383 Cardinal Drive. The slope easement was obtained by the state for CA-163 but was relinquished to the City because it was no longer needed. The project description on the general application states "The proposed project will consist of 3 stories of apartments totaling 30 units at approximately 35,000sqft and one story of garaged parking at approx. 13,500sqft." This will be an annex to the existing Modernaire Apartment Complex.

WATER INFORMATION AND REBATES

The following information has been copied/adapted from the San Diego City and County websites.

Water Information

General Water Conservation Information – 619-533-7485

Restrictions Applicable to Residences (San Diego Municipal Code, Section 67.3803)

- Repair or stop all water leaks upon discovery or within 72 hours of notification by the City.
- Water before 10 a.m. and after 6 p.m. from June to October; before 10 a.m. and after 4 p.m. from November to May. There are exceptions; refer to code.
- Customers "shall not allow water to leave their property due to drainage onto adjacent properties or public or private roadways or streets or gutters due to excessive irrigation and/or uncorrected leaks."
- Running hose to wash down sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, tennis courts, patios or other paved areas prohibited except for immediate safety or sanitization hazards.
- Overfilling of swimming pools and spas prohibited.
- Decorative water fountains must use a recirculating pump.
- Vehicles washed only at a commercial car wash or by using a hose with an automatic shutoff nozzle or with a hand-held container.

Enforcement and penalties (www.sandiego.gov/water/conservation/drought/enforcement.shtml) — Report water waste by calling 619-533-5271 or waterwaste@sandiego.gov.

A Code Enforcement Officer or Water Waste Investigator follows up on water waste violations. Remedies begin with information about restrictions and resources available from the City to assist in complying with regulations. Remedies include:

- Warning letter;
- Administrative Citations (\$100, \$250, \$500, \$750, and \$1,000);
- Notice of Violation (Civil Penalties up to \$2,500 per day per violation);
- Referral to the City Attorney for Civil or Criminal prosecution;
- Shut off water service.

Also, to help estimate home water usage the San Diego County Water Authority offers a Residential Household Water Use Calculator at http://www.watersmartsd.org/water-calculator.

New Neighborhood Parking Rules

Permits Required Starting August 17, 2014

The San Diego City Council adopted a new **Neighborhood Parking Protection Ordinance** that restricts overnight parking of "oversized vehicles, non-motorized vehicles and recreational vehicles". This ordinance is authorized by Sections 86.0138 through 86.0143 of the San Diego Municipal Code.

Oversized vehicles are defined as any vehicle, including any attached trailers, vehicles or loads thereon, that exceeds 27 feet in length AND 7 feet in height. Non-motorized vehicles include open and closed trailers with or without loads.



Permits will be Required

Recreational vehicles owners may obtain a permit allowing overnight parking. A permit is valid for one 24-hour period. Permit applicants may obtain up to three consecutive days (72 hours total) at one time. Applicants may purchase up to 72 days of permits per year. **The permit is only valid on the same block as the resident's address**.

Recreational Vehicles are defined as "any camp trailer, camper, trailer coach, or house car," in the Vehicle Code, or, "any boat, dune buggy, all-terrain vehicle (ATV) or other motorized or towed vehicle designed, maintained or used primarily for recreational purposes." Individuals must offer proof of residency in advance of purchasing the permit. Permit applicants – once confirmed by City staff – may purchase up to three consecutive permits (72 hours). Applicants may purchase up to 72 days of permits per year.





Recreational vehicles and trailers like these are subject to permit requirements


The new ordinance includes an automated permit system. That system went "live" via the City Treasurer's website on July 8 (http://www.sandiego.gov/parking/permits/torvp/index.shtml). It allows permit applicants to provide appropriate proof of residency. Permits will become available for purchase on August 17 when the ordinance officially goes into effect.

KUDOS FOR SPECIAL SERRA MESANS




Michael "Mic" Hudon, Tecate Peak: The Edge, fiction published in May 2014. This story starts with action and ends with action. In between, in its nearly 300 delicious pages, there are continuing and interwoven subplots packed full with passion, drama, love lost and regained, moral dilemma, brotherhood, and suspense, always sandwiched by more action. Tecate Peak traces the ebb and flow, the frenzy and the calm that is the day to day life of Harry Dugan, a cop from a family of cops who proves to be the epitome of the old adage "no good deed goes unpunished." The City will adhere to a grace period for vehicles parked in violation of the ordinance between August 17 and August 31. All citations issued after the grace period will include a first notification with no associated fines. Subsequent violations will levy a \$100 fine to vehicle owners.

Permitted vehicles

- Camp Trailer
- Camper
- Trailer Coach
- House Car
- Boat
- · Dune Buggy
- All-Terrain Vehicle
- Other motorized or towed vehicle designed, maintained, or used primarily for recreation purposes

Non-Permitted Vehicles

- Any Trailer or Trailer Bus, as Defined in Vehicle Code Sections 630 and 636
- Any vehicle, including any attached trailers, vehicles or loads thereon, that exceeds 27 feet in length and 7 feet in height

City of San Diego Grass Replacement Rebate for Residential Customers – Converting a traditional grass lawn to sustainable landscaping can reduce water usage by up to 70%. Switching from grass and sprinklers to water-wise plants and micro irrigation systems can save up to 44 gallons of water annually for each square foot of converted landscaping.

Guidelines

- Beginning September 1, 2014, the City is offering a rebate of up to \$2 per square foot for residential sites that replace existing grass with water wise landscaping. Preliminary site inspection is required to confirm qualification.
 - o Rebate limit is 2,400 square feet and \$4,800 per site for front, side and back yard grass removal
 - o Minimum conversion per application is 400 square feet (If area is less than 400 square feet it must be 100% of front, side or backyard grass area.)
- All projects must be completed within 120 days of City-designated start date.
- Projects that DO NOT qualify include those that install artificial turf, other turf grasses or vegetable gardens, as well as sites that use recycled water.

Additional Grass Replacement Rebate Opportunity – An additional \$2 per square foot rebate for turf/grass replacement may be available through the regional SoCal Water\$mart Rebate Program at http://www.socalwatersmart.com/index.php/qualifyingproducts/turfremoval?p=res. Unlike the City's grass replacement rebate program, only one rebate per site is allowed.

Micro-Irrigation (http://www.sandiego.gov/water/pdf/conservation/microirrigationguidelines.pdf) – Effective September 1, 2014, a City of San Diego Public Utilities Department customer may qualify for a rebate to replace an existing overhead spray sprinkler system with micro-irrigation (i.e. micro-spray, drip, in-line emitters, etc.). Converting to micro irrigation can save up to 9 gallons of water annually for each square foot of converted area.

Rules for Residential Customers

- Customers served by an individual water meter may receive up to a \$0.30 per square foot rebate in grass replacement areas and in existing flower, shrub and vegetable beds.
- Rebate limit is up to 3,000 square feet and \$900 per site, with a minimum conversion of 400 square feet.
- All projects must be completed within 120 days of City-designated start date.

Rain Barrel Rebate for San Diego Residential Customers (http://www.sandiego.gov/water/conservation/residentialoutdoor/resrainwaterharvesting.shtml) – Landscapes can soak up more than 50% of the water used at a typical San Diego home. Capturing rain from your roof is a quick way to conserve water to use for landscape irrigation and help prevent pollution by reducing the amount of runoff entering our storm drain system.

City of San Diego Public Utilities residential customers can receive a cash-back rebate when purchasing and installing a rain barrel and connecting it to the home's rain gutter downspout. Rebates will be distributed on a first-come, first served basis and funding is limited.

Receive up to \$1.00 per gallon of barrel storage capacity for rain barrel rebate program, up to 400 gallons and \$400 per property. Minimum total storage capacity to receive a rebate is 50 gallons. Connecting several rain barrels is acceptable. Only the cost of the rain barrel is eligible for a rebate. Expense for labor, taxes, shipping, and incidental material related to installation do not qualify, nor do homemade rain barrels.

Additionally, City water customers may qualify for the SoCal Water\$mart's separate rain barrel rebate program (http://www.socalwatersmart.com/index.php/qualifyingproducts/rain-barrels). This program provides \$75 per qualifying rain barrel; minimum rain barrel size is 50 gallons.

Free On-Site Water Conservation Surveys – 619-570-1990 or email watersurvey@sandiego.gov (http://www.sandiego.gov/water/conservation/residentialoutdoor/survey.shtml) – The City of San Diego offers residential customers free on-site indoor and landscape water conservation surveys that provide customized information on how to save water and money.

Mulch from Miramar Greenery – 858-492-6100

(http://www.sandiego.gov/environmental-services/miramar/greenery/cmw.shtml) — Applying mulch to your garden will reduce the need to water. City residents may load (by self or staff) up to two cubic yards of compost or mulch at the Miramar Landfill for free with proof of residency. One cubic yard is equal to the size of six 32-gallon trash cans. Wood chips can be purchased for a modest fee.

Rebates Offered for High-Efficiency Toilets - The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California offers a rebate on low-flow toilets. For information and the application, visit the SoCal Water\$mart website, http://www.socalwatersmart.com/index.php/home/?p=res.

Rebates for Appliances - When purchasing a new appliance ask about any applicable rebates.
