PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Who will you vote for?

I am not attempting to tell you what you should do. I am only telling you that what we are doing is not selecting the candidate who will represent our best interest. SERRA MESA PLANNING GROUP NEWS

The Serra Mesa Planning Group (SMPG) is officially recognized by the City and makes recommendations on land use issues to the City. SMPG meets the third Thursday of the month, 7 pm, at the Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa Library, 9505 Aero Drive. The next meetings are January 21 and February 18 (possible change in meeting location). To contact us, email smpg@serramesa.org.

SMPG's revised bylaws increase the number of Board members to 15. With one vacancy and the approved increase in membership **SMPG** has four board openings. Also, on March 17, 2016 SMPG will conduct an annual election for board members for two year terms. Anyone who is at least 18 years old, affiliated with the community as a property owner, resident of Serra Mesa, or a local Serra Mesa business person and who has attended two SMPG meetings is eligible to be elected. Summary of November 19 and December 17 Meeting

Decision Making Process for Franklin Ridge Road Connection Environmental Impact Report between Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa and Civita in Mission Valley – An EIR is being conducted for an amendment for the Serra Mesa Community Plan. This is the information that was emailed to SMPG from City staff:

Community Plan Amendment Approval Process:

- 1. City releases draft environmental impact report (EIR) for 60-day public review
- 2. City presents the community plan amendment and draft EIR to the Community Planning Group for a recommendation
- 3. City responds to comments received during the public review process and prepares the final EIR
- 4. City presents community plan amendment and final EIR to the Planning Commission for a recommendation
- 5. City presents community plan amendment to the City Council Smart Growth and Land Use Committee for a recommendation
- 6. City presents community plan amendment and final EIR to the City Council for approval

Serra Mesa Gateway Sign on Sandrock Road – Alliance Residential Company, developer of the Broadstone Corsair project on Aero Drive, presented designs for a new gateway sign within the median of the Sandrock Road public right-of-way. A straw vote from the audience indicated nearly unanimous support for the canyon design located on the following page. SMPG voted to recommend the canyon design. Also, SMPG asked that the sign include solar and be two-sided. The leasing sign located at the Broadstone Corsair entryway represents an example of the "thick" aluminum material that will be used for the Serra Mesa gateway sign.

Franklin Ridge Road Subcommittee Formed – The main purpose of this subcommittee will be to review the EIR when it becomes available and draft a response letter for the review of the Serra Mesa Planning Group. If you're interested in participating on this subcommittee, please send an email to smpg@serramesa.org. This *Observer* edition includes an information sheet on Franklin Ridge Road.

Citygate Report on Fire Station Funding and Proposed Fire Station in Serra Mesa – A presentation was made by City Council President Pro Tem Marti Emerald, fire department representatives, and other staff explaining the need to build more fire stations in order to decrease response time. SMPG was asked to approve a letter to conceptually support the Citygate Report for new fire stations and conceptually support public bond financing, subject to voter approval, to design, construct, and equip new fire stations throughout the City of San Diego. The report includes a proposal for a Serra Mesa fire station, which came as a surprise to SMPG. SMPG passed a motion to approve the program as presented with the exception that **the Serra Mesa fire station site be presented to SMPG before being approved by the City**. The City owns land at the end of Encino and at this meeting this site was mentioned as a possible location. An audience member suggested the lot at the corner of Ruffin Road and Gramercy Drive. Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa Library Solar Project – An approximately 140 K W solar carport canopy system will be installed at the library as part of a city-wide effort to install approximately 6.6 megawatts of solar at 25 different locations. The system will be installed by a third party provider through a Power Purchase Agreement. It's anticipated that the generated solar energy will offset 80% of the library's energy use. The project is anticipated to begin in the summer of 2016 and be completed by the end of 2016. Staff will provide more information in the future.

Update & News

Speed Limit Change – The City is required by the state to survey the prevailing speeds on classified streets every seven years to keep the speed limits radar enforceable under the provisions of the state law. Survey results indicate that the speed limit must be changed for Mobley Street between Dolly Place and Gramercy Drive from 25 miles per hour to 30 miles per hour.

Agenda Items for January 21

Conditional Use Permit for Private K-12th Education Facility at 8401-8461 Aero Drive (first floor of the former San Diego Community College building) in the Kearny Mesa area. The school, a French immersion program, is currently located at Clairemont Mesa Blvd.

Redevelopment of the Kelco building at 8225 Aero Drive in the Kearny Mesa area – Possible mixed use project. The developer is interested in a dialog with the community before definitive plans are developed. Developer welcomes and encourages input.

Future Agenda Item

Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Franklin Ridge Road connection between Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa and Civita in Mission Valley – It was reported in the November/December edition of the *Observer* that staff would make a presentation on this item at the November 19 meeting. After the newsletter was sent to the printer staff notified SMPG that the EIR was not ready for a presentation. Watch for an email notification from SMPG for confirmation of the date of this agenda item and the location of the meeting. To receive email notices, sign up at www.serramesa.org/. Once the draft EIR is completed, the public has 60 days to comment.




Ever wonder what 267 pounds of sweet potatoes looks like?

Serra Mesa Enhancement Committee

The Serra Mesa Enhancement Committee is not operational. Mutually agreed upon procedures are being developed. To report a violation to the City of San Diego call 619-236-5500 or fill out the form online at http://www.sandiego.gov/ced/report/investigation.shtml. You will be required to provide your name and contact information. This information is kept confidential.

At http://www.sandiego.gov/development-services/opendsd/ the City provides the following information:

Land development permit – application, issuance, inspection, and completion dating back to 2003; timelines, scope, decisions, and costs.

Code Enforcement – cases dating back to 2011. Provides information on date of complaint, description of complaint, source, close date, close reason, inspection due date, investigator contact information.

Search options include browsing by a specific address or by the map (exact address not needed). There's a tremendous amount of information available and the site is user friendly. The Code Enforcement information is easy to understand. The Land Development information is more complicated and difficult for the person unfamiliar with the construction field. The City provides FAQs on the website. If you're interested in what's happening in your neighborhood, you may be interested in the website.

Cindy took over ownership of her café-deli 20 years ago, as the 3rd owner of what was originally called Shrewsbury when founded by two Philadelphia brothers 40 years ago. She and her family also arrived here from Pennsylvania, choosing San Diego because her brother lived here (maybe the change in weather was also a factor). She's the chief cook (and bottle washer) who cooks up fresh soups, baked goods and sandwiches every day. In addition to the food, her café at 3373 Sandrock Rd. is worth visiting to check out the walls. She has the main wall covered with pictures of San Diego's history (and the black and red colors of SDSU's Aztecs spread along the wall). Photos highlighting local

aviation history is on another wall. Another wall is covered with kudos from many of the groups that have enjoyed Cindy's good services. For years, she's hosted field trips from Wegeforth, Angier, and Jones elementary schools with kids (250 so far this year) walking over to experience her kitchen, cooking techniques and products, as a treat for doing well at school (as noted by teachers), scoops of ice cream. Several wall photos are thanks for her sponsorship of local soccer and baseball teams. She regularly donates or gives discounted sandwiches to local military groups for key events. At the end of each day, she donates any leftovers to help homeless.

Local community activist Geralyn White is a frequent visitor and notes how Cindy greets people not only as customers but as friends (indications of that are in wall photos of some long-timers). On the bulletin board are many business cards helping customers promote their own businesses. On the personal side, Cindy lives in Lakeside, because our SM neighborhood is not a conducive environment for her three horses (she recently adopted horse #3 from a Bonita animal shelter). She also gets a lot of joy from three grandkids.

Information on Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for Franklin Ridge Road Extension from Civita (formerly Quarry Falls) in Mission Valley to Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa

Timeline

March 15, 2005 – City Council denied the road connection.

October 22, 2008 – City Council approved the Quarry Falls development (4,780 residential units, 900,000 s.f. of retail and office, 17.5 acres of parks, open space and trails, and optional school site). The EIR for the project studied different alternatives including one with the road connection and one without the road connection.

Also, the City Council authorized **the initiation of a Serra Mesa Community Plan amendment.** The Serra Mesa Community Plan does not show a road connection. **The initiation states**:

"...the initiation of a community plan amendment in no way confers adoption of a plan amendment and City Council is in no way committed to adopt or deny the amendment once it goes forward for approval;...this Council directs staff to analyze the following issues in relation to the aforementioned street connection and land use plan amendments:

- 1. Whether police and fire response times would be improved with the road connection.
- 2. Whether the road connection could serve as an emergency evacuation route.
- 3. Whether it is feasible to make the road available for emergency access only.
- 4. Whether pedestrian and bicycle access would be improved by the street connection."

February 7, 2012 – City conducted a community scoping meeting to obtain input on items that should be studied in the EIR for the road connection. SMPG and SMCC each submitted letters describing items that will create an impact and need to be studied. It was explained that the City would hire a consultant for assistance with the EIR.

Note: The Serra Mesa Planning Group opposed the road connection in 2005 and 2008.

Facts About the EIR

- EIR is being prepared for a Serra Mesa Community Plan amendment to allow a four lane Franklin Ridge Road extension from Civita in Mission Valley to Phyllis Place (across from City View Church) in Serra Mesa.
- Six acres of the Civita development are located in Serra Mesa. A 1.3 acre park will be built on Phyllis Place across from City View Church by the developer. The EIR, required by the state, evaluates environmental impacts, including traffic, air quality, neighborhood character, etc.
- Cost of EIR paid from City's general funds.
- The Civita developer has taken a neutral position on the road connection.

Process for deciding whether the Franklin Ridge Road connection will be built:

- After the release of the draft EIR the public (individuals and entities) has 60 days to make comments.
- Serra Mesa Planning Group, at a noticed meeting, can decide to make a recommendation to support or oppose the road connection.
- City staff prepares a report responding to all EIR comments and makes their recommendation.
- City Planning Commission hears item at a noticed meeting and votes on their recommendation to City Council.
- San Diego City Council hears item at a noticed meeting and makes the final decision.

Addressing Pedestrian Dangers on Health Center Drive

Several recent traffic incidents involving pedestrians have occurred on Health Center Drive. The map below is a dramatic illustration of how serious the problem is.

Many of these incidents resulted from pedestrians crossing from parked cars on the west side of the street to the Sharp campus. To help address this, Sharp leadership has worked with the City of San Diego, which has jurisdiction over this street, to eliminate parking on the west side of Health Center Drive between Frost Street and Vista Hill Avenue. Additionally, the bus stop currently located on the west side of the street at Mary Birch Lane will be consolidated with the bus stop to the north, at Frost Street.

These changes are anticipated in early 2016. To reduce the impact on parking in the area, the City will try to remove some of the red curb on the east side of the street to add new parking spaces. Additionally, Sharp has launched an offsite parking and shuttle service for employees and students who come to the campus regularly during the workweek. Since launching in September, the service has grown to over 70 riders, and plans are underway to expand it further.

These changes are necessary to help ensure the safety of all those who work, visit, and seek care at Sharp's Serra Mesa campus. We also find it difficult to find and communicate with those in Serra Mesa who are interested in/need the services of the Village.
