

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



A New Concern for Montgomery-Gibbs Airport

It has been brought to my attention that we have an issue with lead in aviation fuel which the E.P.A. has not enforced with a probable influence of Airline Industry lobbyists. A study by Marie Lynn Miranda of Duke University definitively states that the emissions from General Aviation airplanes are affecting children up to .6 miles of Regional Airports in Durham, N.C.

In August of 2017, a study by Pew Charitable Trusts regarding children and lead poisoning with the result that Children living .6 miles from an airport is 5.7% higher than those children living 2.5 miles from an airport.

In 2014, 28 airports were sued for violating Prop 65 (Clean Air Act), and \$500,000 is paid to the Center for Environmental Health (CEH) and are required to put up warning signs. On October 5, 2017, Governor Brown signed legislation requiring all children between 12 and 24 months of age to be tested for lead in their blood.

The FAA has been testing alternative fuels since 2013 to replace Avgas at the William J Hughs facility in Atlantic City, New Jersey. A progress report given in 2017 states that they are in Phase 2.

So far, the only action taken is signs posted adjacent to the airport. Some cure huh?

The airport is a training facility for new pilots who come from all over the world to learn to fly. That means a lot of touch and go which means more takeoffs and landings. I know this is a profitable business for flying schools but of what benefit is it to the community. Just a lot of leaded air.

Come on community leaders, who is looking after the safety of our citizens? Let's clean up this area which was cleaned up in the outlawing of leaded gas for automobiles in 1973. It seems that a lot of us are suffering for the benefit of a few.

San Diego Continuing Education Graduate Starts Fast-Growing Self-Care Line "Leonie Lemon"

Making it as a top fashion designer can be a challenge, but for Leonie Molina Gonzales, she used her skills she learned at San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) to become an entrepreneur in the top trending health and fitness world.

Leonie enrolled in Sewing Fundamentals at SDCE's West City Campus in Point Loma. "We started off by learning how to sew a tote bag using many techniques from sewing a zipper to finishing seams with a serger," she said. "Prior to taking sewing classes I didn't even know that there was a correct way to cut fabric."

SDCE's fashion students receive a multitude of technical and creative skills such as pattern making and tailoring to create their own designs.

"Before I graduated from SDCE I was working many random jobs that were not fulfilling," said Leonie, 33.

Her newfound fashion skills allowed Leonie to start "Leonie Lemon" a self-care product company that sells eye pillows, neck pillows and plant accessories and products to help reduce waste.

Last year, West Elm and Pottery Barn invited Leonie to host a "Leonie Lemon" pop-up shop in their stores. She also sells products to local yoga studios and at yoga festivals.

Leonie will continue her education this fall in SDCE's Business Program to expand her self-care line.

Fashion students at SDCE often transition to San Diego Mesa College and a credit by exam agreement allows them to earn college credit for completed noncredit classes at SDCE to use toward an associate of science degree in fashion.

Free fashion classes take place at SDCE's Cesar Chavez, West City and North City Campuses in San Diego, California. Fall classes begin September 4.

FREE CHILD / ELDERLY ID EVENT

The Kearny Mesa Moose Lodge 1852 / Chapter 1337 will be holding a Free Child / Elderly ID Event on Saturday, August 4, 2018.

Moose Lodges throughout San Diego County are bringing an identification system to parents and guardians that may make it easier to find missing children, elderly people with dementia, or anyone with special needs.

In the U.S., approximately 2,000 children are reported missing and thousands of elderly wander off every day. The first 48 hours are imperative for locating a missing person, there is no time to waste. Are you prepared for such an emergency?

The EZ Child / Elderly ID system digitally records a person's fingerprints, photographs, height, weight, eye & hair color, birthmarks, scars, and burns them to a CD for the parent or guardian to keep in case of an emergency. Should someone become missing, this information can easily be e-mailed or personally delivered to law enforcement. The sooner a readily available, complete description of a missing person can be broadcast, transmitted or converted into flyers and poster, the better! This gives law enforcement the best possible tools to locate the missing individual.


To provide the FREE IDs, the Loyal Order of Moose, a fraternal service organization, has partnered with the Safe Surfin' Foundation. The Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, aims to prevent children from becoming victims of internet predators. Safe Surfin' was founded in 2000 by Sheriff Michael Brown and Robin Sundquist of the Bedford County sheriff's Office in Virginia and is the educational "arm" of the nationally recognized Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force.

The EZ Child / Elderly ID System is the nations' most comprehensive digital fingerprinting child and elderly identification system. All personal data is erased from the computer after it is burned to the CD. No data is ever collected or stored and NO FEE is ever charge for this service.

City Accepting Applications for Urban Agriculture Incentive Zones

Two years ago, the San Diego City Council unanimously approved my Urban Agricultural Incentive Zone Proposal, a program that will help expand community access to fresh produce through a property tax incentive for qualifying land owners to allow urban gardens on their property.

Finally, after years of delay at the County level, a new website for the program was published last week. Applications and an interactive map highlighting eligible lots are available for the public to view.

The program will provide communities throughout the City with an economic tool to incentivize the development of community gardens on eyesore properties.

This measure will reduce the property tax due on a participating parcel owner in exchange for a minimum five-year contract for the usage of the site for urban agriculture.

The parcels must meet the standards established in State Code and the City of San Diego ordinance. The parcel must be vacant or unimproved. A vacant parcel can have some form of improvements such as a slab but cannot contain structures. Unimproved means the parcel is empty with no form of improvements on it. Parcels must be between 0.1 and 3 acres (4,356 and 130,680 square feet).

This new program will help further our mission of developing and maintaining an equitable, healthy, and sustainable food system in San Diego.


The current Airport Master Plan includes an environmental study that states that Montgomery has lead particle emissions in the amount of 1.4 metric tons per year.
