



Another Serra Mesan going strong past that century mark

When you meet Elbert McCune, you might well conclude this is one fellow taking on life well. He'll hit the 102 mark on his upcoming July 13 birthday. "I was born on Friday the 13th," he notes, "That's my lucky number." He's about as active as anyone you likely know, including many much younger. For example every week he's at the historic Balboa Park Spanish Village, teaching a class at the San Diego Mineral & Gem Club. "I first got involved in 1972, learning how to cut large gems. In 1986 I started teaching people how to cut and polish gems and am still doing that."

He was born and raised in a small Missouri town to age 17, joining the Navy in February 1942. In the Navy Air Corp, he was trained in Aviation Maintenance School and got an Air and Engine License. He was assigned to the Submarine Patrol, flying seaplanes that landed in water from many East Coast operations. "One of my Navy career highlights was in February 1945 when we escorted President Roosevelt's fleet armada (partway) across the Atlantic Ocean to the major Yalta conference in Crimea, Soviet Union."



Following his Navy career, he came to San Diego in 1948. With his aviation maintenance training, he hired on to Convair, working on their popular dual engine passenger liners. "I only worked there for six months, as when Navy North Island Air Station offered me a raise of 50 cents/hour I hired on to their Coronado operation. I worked there for 27 years and retired in 1975."

Here he was introduced by a friend to Edna, and they were married on St. Patrick's Day in 1951. They moved into their Serra Mesa new home in 1960, enjoying life here for 4+ decades. Edna passed on in 2001, with Elbert continuing to keep the house in good trim.

Another regular activity and community contribution is his weekly support of the Mission Outreach Thrift Store on Adams Avenue. "I volunteer there for 4 hours every week," he notes, "and am still a maintenance guy, doing repairs and upgrades of items donated by members of the Methodist Church." Did I mention he ushers at the Mission Valley First United Methodist Church every Sunday? Nothing like staying busy to keep life and our Serra Mesa world percolating.



Franklin Ridge Road Connection Update

Summary: An environmental lawsuit regarding the approval of the road connection from Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa to Civita in Mission Valley was filed on November 27, 2017. The "Save Civita Because Sudberry Won't" group, a 501(c)3 nonprofit, is suing to protect public safety and the quality of life in Civita and Serra Mesa. There are Serra Mesa residents on this group's board, who represent Serra Mesa's interests.

Lawsuit Timeline Update: The original timeline stipulated that the City would review and certify the Administrative Record by December 31, 2018. There have been "discussions" between the City and the petitioner's attorney about the documents to be included in the Administrative Record. Consequently, there's been a delay.

The Administrative Record is important because this is the evidence for the lawsuit and incorporates the materials that were directly or indirectly considered by the decision maker, the City Council. Typically the materials that are included are the project application and supplemental documents, environmental documents, staff reports, public hearing records, and comments and submissions from interested parties.

Next steps in the timeline: City files answer to petition > Petitioner (Save Civita Because Sudberry Won't) files brief; City's response > Petitioner's reply > hearing before judge. The judge will decide on the merits of the case.

Planning Commission Hearing on VA Hospital Annex CUP

Project Background: The Veterans Affairs Hospital Annex project, located at 8825-8875 Aero Drive in the Kearny Mesa planning area, proposes "a building renovation that would include two building additions of approximately 25,000 square feet, resulting in a two-story, 139,000-square-foot office building for the hospital use, the construction of a four-story parking garage, and associated improvements. One addition would be located along the northern edge of the building and the second addition would be located along the western edge of the building.

The project proposes to provide services for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), including audiology, pathology, eye clinic, radiology, mental health, and general wellness clinics. A total of 637 parking spaces will be provided, where 486 are required by the San Diego Municipal Code (SDMC). The additional 151 parking spaces are necessary to meet federal requirements." (p. 2, City staff report)

Planning Commission Hearing: Representatives from the Serra Mesa Planning Group (SMPG) and the Serra Mesa Community Council (SMCC) spoke at the Planning Commission hearing on the VA Hospital Annex Conditional Use Permit project on January 31. The SMPG spoke primarily about their efforts to obtain information and the declined invitations to present the project at a community meeting. SMCC presented the concerns regarding the proposed improvement to Sandrock Road and the drainage issue at the Sandrock/Aero intersection. None of the representatives expressed opposition to the VA Hospital Annex. The Planning Commission was asked to either continue the item or to delete the line regarding Sandrock Road, "The northbound approach shall be restriped to provide two dedicated left-turn lanes and a shared thru/right-turn lane."

Drainage at the Sandrock/Aero intersection was discussed. Louis Schultz, City Engineer, <u>LSchultz@sandiego</u>. <u>gov</u>, stated that "Aero is a very challenging drainage system. If a project is going to send an increase to that drain system, then that probably needs to be addressed by the project. But if they are not, then that is not a responsibility of that project."

Planning Commission Decision: The Planning Commission voted unanimously to approve the project as recommended by City staff. According to the CUP the Sandrock improvement "...shall be completed in a manner that is satisfactory to the City Engineer. All improvements shall be installed and operational prior to occupancy."

The Planning Commission didn't discuss who is responsible for the drainage issue.

Future: Your community council and planning group made a valiant effort to represent the best interests of the community. The Planning Commission was asked to foster communication, coordination, and cooperation.

Morris Dye, Development Project Manager for city, mdye@sandiego.gov, indicates that the plans for Sandrock Road presented at the Planning Commission hearing are conceptual. "A design will be approved during public improvement plan review." In a subsequent communication Morris indicated that "The public improvement plan would be a plan submitted by the applicant for City transportation staff to review. It is a ministerial review similar to a building permit review which does not solicit public input." From the City's public information officer, "…please submit any inquiries about the project details including plans for the ensuing submittal of a public improvement plan regarding the intersection, directly to the applicant Steven Bossi or the Atlantis Group." Growing Up in a Medical Family: Free Career Education helps Student become a CNA

San Diego Continuing Education prepares students for CNA examination

The healthcare industry is showing rapid growth across Southern California and San Diego residents could strengthen their earning power with free career education.

The largest provider of noncredit education in California, San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) offers six free Healthcare Career certificates; Nursing Assistant, Rehabilitative Nursing Assistant, Acute Care Nursing Assistant, Personal Care Assistant/Caregiver, Home Health Aide and Behavioral Home Health Aide.

Faithe Thogode was raised in a family of healthcare professionals but never intended to choose the same career as her parents until trying SDCE's free program.

Faithe has been a barista and a doggy daycare manager for years. "It's my time to learn, further my career and earn better wages," she stated.

For 4 months, she commuted from Poway to Barrio Logan to attend SDCE's Cesar Chavez Campus, the Campus of Excellence for Healthcare Careers.

Though she may not be far along in her studies yet, Faithe had a career advantage growing up in a medical family. Both of her parents are well educated; her dad works as a Psychiatric Licensed Vocational Nurse and her mom is a Registered Nurse.

Through lecture and hands-on skills practice, SDCE's Nursing Assistant training program students learn to assist patients as well as report changes in their physical or mental status. The comprehensive course prepares students for the CNA examination and graduates become certified as a Nurse Assistant by the State of California.

Following SDCE, Faithe accepted a position as a CNA with a Grossmont hospital.

After certification completion, SDCE students are ready for entry-level employment or can transition to San Diego Mesa College to pursue an associate degree in Medical Assisting or Health Information Technology and then toward a bachelor's degree in Health Information Management. Mesa is one of fifteen local community colleges to take part in California's Baccalaureate Pilot Program.
