PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Last month, we reviewed some of our current affairs in Serra Mesa, which included our Serra Mesa – Civita Road connection, leaded aviation fuel emissions from Montgomery Gibbs Municipal Airport, and the need for a Center for our seniors. Sorry that there are no current updates as there are no changes at the time of this writing. From my perspective, our elected officials are not listening, which leads us to the conclusion that we need "new" elected officials. One of the ways we can accomplish this is to work to provide "Clean Elections" which is the funding of neighborhood candidates to run for office provided by public funds instead of funding by developers and special interest groups. If you are interested and want to know more about Clean elections, you can go to www.sdcleanelections.org.

At our last Community Council meeting, we had a presentation by SDSU West for the new development at Qualcomm Stadium, Currently SDCCU stadium, where we learned that after the last Aztec Football game, demolition is planned to take place. The new stadium is planned to open for the 2022 Football Season. At the latest presentation, SDSU offered 68.2 million along with some sweeteners to bring the deal to an estimated 150 million. In addition, some issues

need to be resolved, such as a Fenton Parkway Bridge to connect to Camino Del Rio North for which SDSU will front 22 million. No mention, warnings, or concern over the effect of the construction on Serra Mesa. Who is looking out for our best interests, certainly not SDSU or The City. Keep in mind that 13 intersections and 12 freeway segments will be impacted, yet where is the EIR that affects Serra Mesa. Get ready, Serra Mesa, your worst nightmare is coming.

Mark the date January 22nd as we will be hosting a District 7 Candidate Forum for 7th District City Council candidates, this will be your chance to meet the candidates close and personal. It is anticipated to be an exciting time as we get to hear what position the candidates are taking. Our current councilmember is terming out, and many are attempting to take his place. I have contacted all the candidates and am attempting to acquaint them with our issues. Make sure you are there to make your feelings known.

Keep in mind; this will be the last printed Observer. Future issues will be available only online. Remember to go to www.serramesa.org, click on community council, then on Observer.

The year would not be complete without our heartfelt thanks to the SMCC Board, Cindy McIntyre, Andrea Eaton, Cindy Moore, Jon Cima, Jackie Ander, Tom Leech, and Rebecca Moreno. No longer accepted except in a special situation.

Special Situation:

We recognize that some of you may not have Internet service or have a special need for a paper copy. An arrangement will be made for your special situation.

Reasons for Decision:

The *Observer* has been published and mailed for 33 years. We thank all of you who have been loyal subscribers. We recognize that this decision may be a disappointment. This hard decision was made based primarily on the following:

Costs – Increase in cost of printing the newsletter. Since the number of subscriptions has steadily declined, we will reach the point this year where the *Observer* no longer qualifies for the cheapest mailing rate. The new mailing rate would be cost prohibitive.

Volunteers – Maintaining a subscription database and mailing the *Observer* requires a lot of volunteers hours. Dedicated volunteers have provided this service for decades. If any of these volunteers needed a break, it would be a challenge to replace them.

Timeliness – An online publication will provide more timely information.

Donations:

Graffiti

If you receive NextDoor notifications, you may have noticed comments regarding an increase in graffiti in Serra Mesa. Research shows removing graffiti as quickly as possible discourages more graffiti.

Graffiti Information - Adapted from the City of San Diego Website at https://www.sandiego.gov/street-div/services/graffiti

- Reporting Graffiti: If you see anyone tagging property, don't confront the person. Contact 9-1-1.
- Reporting Existing Graffiti: Report graffiti on public or private property to the Graffiti Control Program Graffiti Hotline, 619-527-7500, or online at https://getitdone.force.com/TSWNewReport?type=Graffiti. The City endeavors to remove graffiti from City property within five days of a report. The City will notify private property owners of their responsibility for removing graffiti from their property.

Graffiti Deterrents

- Special products applied to surface to make them graffiti resistant
- Good lighting on vulnerable walls and fences
- Plant shrubs or climbing vines, especially plants with thorns or foul scents
- Painted utility boxes

Painting Utility Boxes

In 2013 the Serra Mesa Community Council (SMCC) established a Serra Mesa Utility Box Project. SMCC has permission from SDG&E to paint artwork on any of their utility boxes in the community. This project was created to both beautify the community and deter graffiti tagging. Talented local artists are recruited to paint the boxes.

To cover the cost of materials SMCC asks for a \$100 donation from any resident who wishes to have a utility box painted in their area. The donation is requested because SMCC doesn't have the extra funds to pay for a community-wide utility box painting project. Before the final painting of the utility box SMCC must approve the design.

Franklin Ridge Road Connection Update

Summary: An environmental lawsuit regarding the approval of the road connection from Phyllis Place in Serra Mesa to Civita in Mission Valley was filed on November 27, 2017. The "Save Civita Because Sudberry Won't" group, a 501(c)3 nonprofit, is suing to protect public safety and the quality of life in Civita and Serra Mesa. There are Serra Mesa residents on this group's board, who represent Serra Mesa's interests.

Lawsuit Timeline Update: **The trial date is December 5.** The judge will issue a tentative ruling on December 4th. The brief and the City's response and any changes will be posted at http://www.serramesa.org/hot-topics/.

Steps in the timeline: City certifies administrative record > City files answer to petition > Petitioner (Save Civita Because Sudberry Won't) files brief; City's response > Petitioner's reply > hearing before judge. The judge will decide on the merits of the case.

Serra Mesa Community Plan Amendment Request for Rezone and Street Vacation

Applicant: Private owner; since 1982

Location: Two adjoining parcels west of I-805 and north of Mission Center Road which form a long triangle. (The triangular long side runs parallel with the I-805.) The steep southern edge descends to Mission Center Road. The rest of property is mainly flat.

Status: Northern portion is zoned RS1-4, which requires minimum 10,000 s.f. lots, 4 units per acre (before density bonuses); Southern portion is zoned OR-1-1. OR zones preserve Multiple Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) preserve and open space designations and allow single dwelling units (additional MHPA regulations may apply).


Request: 1) Rezone parcels to RM1-1 (3,000/units); 2) Allow street closure, Raleigh Ave, and Alley (doesn't currently exist; would intersect with Mission Center Road). Application at http://www.serramesa.org/smpg/major-projects/.

Proposal: 14-16 dwelling units

Biology Report: Impacts four sensitive plans species, one sensitive lizard species, and potentially other sensitive, wideranging species. Project will impact Environmentally Sensitive Lands. Detailed report at http://www.serramesa.org/smpg/major-projects/.

Requirement: MHPA Boundary Adjustment would be required because MHPA encumbers 75% of the property. The impacts within the MHPA require 1.4 ac offsite mitigation.

Process: Either Planning Commission or City Council initiation is required before a community plan amendment process can proceed. Staff is in process of reviewing the application and will be requesting a Planning Commission date within the next few months depending on staff availability. The Serra Mesa Planning Group is requested to provide a recommendation on the initiation action. SMPG listened to the applicant's presentation at their September 19th meeting and will vote on the item at a future meeting.

Finding Serra Mesa???

Confusion reigns! Is it Serra Mesa or Kearny Mesa? The news media constantly attributes news to the wrong area. For example, restaurants at the Olympus Corsair project at the corner of Aero and Sandrock, a part of Kearny Mesa, are identified as being located in Serra Mesa. Adding to the confusion is the shared 92123 zip code and the Kearny Mesa monument sign on Kearny Villa Road which incorrectly states Kearny Mesa on both sides (north side should state Serra Mesa).

Serra Mesa is composed of neighborhoods with the most prevalent ones being Mission Village (Mission Village Drive area), Birdland (near the hospital complex), Phyllis-Abbots Hill (west of I-805 Murray Ridge bridge), Hye Park (condominium complex on Mission Center Road), and the Village at Serra Mesa (formerly Cabrillo Heights Military Housing. In this Observer edition refer to the article, The Naming of Serra Mesa, for historical background/neighborhood explanation.



Information

- The land use policy and document for the City of San Diego is found in the General Plan and includes 52 community plans approved by the City Council.
- The Serra Mesa Community Plan written in 1977 established the boundaries of Serra Mesa which included the Kearny Mesa area and part of Mission Valley (the sand and gravel extraction sites- the location of the Civita development). Subsequently, the Serra Mesa Planning Group disbanded for many years.
- In 1985, the City Council adopted the Mission Valley Community Plan which separated the sand and gravel sites from Serra Mesa and included them in Mission Valley.
- During the time when the Serra Mesa Planning Group was reorganizing, Kearny Mesa separated from Serra Mesa, forming a planning group, writing a community plan, and being recognized by the City in 1992. Commercial and office parcels along Aero Drive were incorporated into Kearny Mesa, which explains the "odd" looking border shown on the map on the next page.
- The Stonecrest area was originally zoned as office, commercial, and a hotel. Therefore, this area was incorporated into Kearny Mesa. Residential rezoning occurred in the mid-1990s following a recession. The Stonecrest area is part of the Kearny Mesa Planning Group area.
- The 2010 Redistricting Commission of the City of San Diego redrew the City Council boundaries. The south side of Aero Drive (includes Stonecrest area) is located in District 7, represented by City Councilmember Scott Sherman; north side of Aero Drive, District 6, represented by City Councilmember Chris Cate. The redrawing of the boundary doesn't change the community plan boundaries. The 2020 boundaries won't be redrawn until after the final federal census information.
- The Serra Mesa Community Council is a 501(c)3 non-profit group with bylaws that describe the same boundaries as in the Serra Mesa Community Plan.
- 92123 zip code encompasses Serra Mesa and parts of Kearny Mesa.

Walking to School Makes for One Big Day

On the first Wednesday in October, 39 students (and amigos) gathered to take a stroll as a group over to their Serra Mesa Juarez Elementary School. As they strolled, many of them waved flags from multi-countries as this was an official event known as National Walk to School Day. The Juarez students were joined by hundreds of thousands of other students, parents, school officials, and local leaders across the U.S. for the 23rd annual celebration which highlights the importance of safer, more active transportation for youth in their local communities.

Serra Mesan Joanne Snyder said the Juarez students had done this October walk for 5+ years. She volunteers two days per week at Juarez, reading to students from first to third grades. For the Walk, she passed out flags that were provided by another volunteer from Mission Federal Credit Union. "It was a fun event as the kids really enjoyed chatting with each other (and others accompanying them) as they walked and waved their individual flags. They started at Sean & Amulet Streets, with kids also carrying three waist-high call-outs that looked like a miniature school bus, and they walked up Melbourne to the classes at Juarez."

The coordinating agency for this annual event is the National Center for Safe Routes to School. Per Nancy Pullen-Seufert, Center Director. "Participation increases every year, which is quite an impressive legacy of people coming together with the common goal of starting children on the right foot so they can thrive for years to come." So far, in 2019, more than 4,000 schools in all 50 states and Washington, D.C., have registered Walk to School Day events at walkbiketoschool.org.

IS YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH & IQ AT RISK?

As a parent you might sometimes wonder if you are doing enough to protect your child's health and welfare. You make sure they eat healthy foods; you make sure they brush their teeth; you make sure they get enough rest and you take them to regular visits with a pediatrician. But sometimes there are dangers outside of your immediate control.

One of those dangers is lead, a toxic heavy metal. Adults exposed to lead face an increased risk of kidney disease, high blood pressure, hearing loss, and impairment of cognitive functions. But children are particularly vulnerable to lead pollution, and even a very small amount is extremely dangerous for young children. The experts say lead poisoning can lead to a variety of health problems in kids; some of those include decreased bone and muscle growth, poor muscle coordination, as well as hearing, speech and language problems, and developmental delay.

Lead is particularly dangerous for the developing brains of our youngsters. According to a study released by Cornell University, children exposed to supposedly "safe" levels of lead had reduced IQ scores. The World Health Organization and a multitude of other health professionals have found that no amount of lead is safe.

A recent study by MIT researchers found that annually, IQ losses attributed to leaded aviation fuel result in about \$1 billion in damages from lifetime earnings reductions, with an additional \$0.5 billion in economy-wide losses due to decreases in productivity. So the threat to our children and community is very real.

There are at least six schools within a mile radius of Montgomery-Gibbs Executive Airport which generates 1.4 metric tons of toxic lead pollution every year. Children attending those schools are at risk, as well as toddlers and the unborn babies of pregnant women who live in our Serra Mesa neighborhoods, along with other adults who can suffer health problems from lead exposure.

In spite of all the science showing that no amount of lead is safe, the City of San Diego continues to refuse to offer unleaded general aviation fuel at Montgomery-Gibbs Executive Airport which sits right across the street from Serra Mesa. If unleaded UL94 aviation fuel, which a majority of general aviation planes can safely use, was offered alongside leaded Avgas, the danger to our community would be substantially reduced.

However, city and airport officials have decided that it is *not financially viable* for unleaded fuel to be offered at Montgomery Field. In an attempt to place the decision in the hands of voters, the Montgomery-Gibbs Environmental Coalition submitted a ballot proposal to the San Diego City Council Rules Committee in July to let people who live in the community decide the issue in the upcoming elections. It was denied.

There would be City administrative costs associated with offering unleaded fuel at the airport, and costs or reduced profits for fuel suppliers which contract with the City; however such costs are minimal and reasonable compared to the physical and economic burdens faced by victims of lead exposure and the public.

The costs of lead exposure should be shifted away from children and others who are exposed to lead, and onto the companies and government agencies that have the capability and thus the moral duty to protect the public from unnecessary lead pollution. You can help by flooding City Hall with phone calls and email demands that unleaded aviation fuel be offered at Montgomery-Gibbs Executive Airport. You can find more information at mgecsd.org.

The Naming of Serra Mesa

The builders of 1950's and 60's American suburbia did not agree. No title was too grandiose, too cloying or coy to attach to their groupings of mass-produced houses. The tracts of Serra Mesa sprung up after the Korean War were no exception. The area was parceled out into neighborhoods with such unlikely names as Murray Ridge Estates, Princess Park, and Royal Highlands.

Developers carried their fanciful selection of names over into their naming of streets. Our streets bear the names of family members, friends, pets, favorite places or things. Birdland derives its designation from the fact that it was laid out with streets named after birds. In a dispute with his wife over the naming of a street, one builder settled on Haveteur Way or "have it your way."

American Housing Guild's Mission Village, on the other hand, had the distinction of being located within reasonable proximity of its namesake, the Mission San Diego de Alcala. In fact, all of the area we now call Serra Mesa was originally part of the Mission Rancho Lands of San Diego granted to the Catholic Church by the King of Spain.

When Mexico broke the power of the Church in 1834, the lands were deeded over to men like Don Santiago Arguello. His family held onto the grant, about 15,999 acres, as long as it could, but eventually the land was sold, divided, and settled by miscellaneous ranchers and homesteaders.

Our modern suburban history began with the Navy's Cabrillo Heights housing project built in the early 50's after the Korean War. Surrounding development occurred thereafter, most between 1955 and 1965.

The tracts were the creation of developers who were largely oblivious to modern concepts of community planning. Clusters of houses were plopped down here and there with little or no rhyme or reason except that the land was cheap and the parents of baby boomers were in search of nests. The advent of the freeways and imported water also contributed to the sudden expanse of tract housing on our barren mesa.

The name game came to a dramatic conclusion in June of 1961 when the Cabrillo Mission Community Council held a contest to name all of the communities from Birdland to Mission Village. Six names were submitted by area residents. Mrs. John Dowling submitted the winning entry, Serra Mesa. Her prize was a \$25 savings bond and a \$10 gift certificate! The City Council acted swiftly to ratify the selection, and hence forth, our entire community has been known as Serra Mesa.

Perhaps Gertrude Stein was right after all. Whether we live in Mission Village, Princess Park or Birdland we all live in a united Serra Mesa. "A Rose is a Rose is a Rose..."

Coastal Cleanup Day at Library/Rec Canyon

On Saturday, September 21, the Friends of Ruffin Canyon (FRC) hosted another Coastal Cleanup Day event at Library/Rec Canyon, located between the Library and Rec Center. I Love A Clean San Diego (ILACSD) sponsors this event every year, by providing dumpsters, supplies, and publicity for cleanup sites throughout the region.
